Ambassador in Bahrain, he attended high school in this small island kingdom near the western shores of the Persian Gulf, off the coast of Saudi Arabia. When I asked John about his experience in Bahrain he said "It was fun. I had friends from all over the world. It was very multicultural. It opened my eyes to the rest of the world. I got to travel all over and learned that the world is much bigger than Colorado."

John graduated from Georgetown University, School of Foreign Service in Washington, D.C. with a Bachelor of Science in International Affairs. After college, he coached football and basketball at Mullen High School in Denver, Colorado. Later, he attended the University of Denver, College of Law. His curriculum vitae is beyond impressive: Deans List, Honor Society, Member of countless organizations. However, in my opinion, it's not John's academic and professional accomplishments that make him exceptional, but rather his drive to give back to the community and his humility and desire to help those in need.

His passion for kids, and love for helping others in need, led him to open up a small for profit litigation firm that allows him the freedom to perform pro-bono.
